2011 FISA World Rowing Championships

The 2011 FISA World Rowing Championships will be held from August 28 – September 4 on Lake Bled, Slovenia.

The world championships in 2011 serve as the major Olympic qualifying regatta, with Australia attempting to qualify 11 boats from a possible 14 for next year's 2012 London Olympic Games.

Australia will also attempt to qualify two boats for the 2012 London Paralympic Games.

Olympic and Paralympic Qualification

A total of 129 crews can secure qualification for the 2012 London Olympic Games at the 2011 FISA World Rowing Championships, while 32 adaptive crews can gain qualification for the 2012 London Paralympic Games.

2011 Australian Rowing Team

Australia has entered 18 crews into the 2011 FISA World Rowing Championships, with 11 crews participating in Olympic category races, two crews in Paralympic category races, and five in non-Olympic boat classes.

The Australian Rowing Team's season has been focused on the build up to the 2011 FISA World Rowing Championships given the regatta serves as the major qualification event for next year's Olympic and Paralympic Games.

The majority of the Australian team was selected based on results from the 2011 National Selection Trials at the Sydney International Regatta Centre held in April.

Australian crews have competed at four international regattas to date in 2011, starting with Australia's adaptive crews at the International Adaptive Regatta and World Cup 1.

The bulk of Australia's team arrived in Europe in time to compete at the 2011 Henley Royal Regatta in England (June 30-July 3), before also participating at World Cup 3 in Lucerne, Switzerland.

Following the conclusion of World Cup 3, the Australian team descended upon the Australian Institute of Sport's European Training Centre in Italy, where they completed a six week training block in preparation for the world championships.

The athletes were able to make use of the state of the art facilities as well as the beautiful rowing conditions in Varese.

Highlights of the 2011 season to date have included the silver medal won by Kim Crow and Kerry Hore in the women's double scull at World Cup 3, along with the men's quad scull's bronze medal at the same regatta.

Earlier in the year Ben Houlison also won a bronze medal at World Cup 1 in the adaptive men's single scull.

The Australian Rowing Team for the 2011 FISA World Rowing Championships welcomes back Olympic champions Scott Brennan and Drew Ginn into the fold.

Brennan joins David Crawshay in the men's double scull as the duo target back-to-back Olympic gold medals in London next year.

Ginn meanwhile returns to the men's four, the boat in which he won his first Olympic gold medal as part of the 'Oarsome Foursome' in 1996. Joining Ginn in the men's four are Joshua Dunkley Smith, Nicholas Purnell and Sam Loch, all members of the crew that won a gold medal during the 2010 World Cup circuit.

Three of Australia's female crews remain the same as 2010, with Kim Crow and Kerry Hore filling the seats in the women's double scull; Alice McNamara and Hannah Every-Hall contesting the women's lightweight double scull; and Sarah Tait and Phoebe Stanley aiming to improve on their fourth place in the women's pair.

The women's quad scull retains Sally Kehoe and Brooke Pratley from the 2010 crew, with 2008 Olympians Sarah Cook and Amy Clay forming the quartet.

Australia's men's quad scull has remained strong across the course of the current Olympic cycle and sees only one change, with Chris Morgan filling the seat left free by Crawshay. He joins Daniel Noonan, Karsten Forsterling and James McRae, with the crew looking to add to their silver and bronze medals won at the past two world championships.

Australia's men's lightweight four crew includes Anthony Edwards, Todd Skipworth and Sam Beltz, all members of the crew that won silver last year in Karapiro, with Ben Cureton joining in the 3 seat. While the men's eight crew sees several changes from 2010, it will again be coxed by Toby Lister.

Nicholas Hudson will race in the men's single scull and Cameron McKenzie-McHarg and Tom Larkins will contest the men's pair.

In Paralympic racing, Erik Horrie makes his world championship debut in the arms only men's single scull, while Kathryn Ross and John Maclean reunite in the trunk and arms mixed double scull as they look to add to their silver medals from the 2007 World Championships and the 2008 Beijing Paralympic Games.

About Rowing Australia

Rowing is one of the cornerstone Olympic sports and Rowing Australia enjoys close working relationships with the Australian Sports Commission(ASC), Australian Olympic Committee (AOC), Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) and the network of State and Territory Institutes and Academies of Sport.

Rowing Australia and the Australian Institute of Sport have combined their high performance rowing programs to optimise international performances and results. To achieve this objective, and to provide a united national direction for high performance rowing in Australia, the National Rowing Centre of Excellence (NRCE) was formed in 2008 as a joint venture that incorporates the entirety of Rowing Australia's High Performance Program and the AIS Residential Scholarship and National Camps Programs.

Rowing Australia is the national governing body for the sport of rowing. Formed in 1925, it is the only organisation recognised by the Federation Internationale des Societies d'Aviron (FISA), the ASC and the AOC to conduct rowing activities in and on behalf of Australia.

Rowing Australia and its affiliates represent in excess of 20,000 active members and over 60,000 participants ranging from young rowers at school through to those at universities and clubs and in the wider community, right through to veteran rowers. Rowing Australia member associations operate in seven States and Territories with over 250 schools and 200 clubs offering rowing programs.

Australia's World Rowing Championship Medal Winners

Australian rowing has a long and proud history of success on the water and consistently wins multiple medals at major international competitions.

At the 2003 FISA World Championships in Milan, Australia won six medals and qualified 12 boats (out of a possible 14) to compete at the Athens Olympics in 2004. The only other country to equal this achievement was Germany.

At the 2004 Olympic Games, Australia won one gold medal, one silver medal and two bronze medals. Australia finished as the top men's nation at the Games, being the only country to win three medals in men's events. In the overall tally, Australia was one of only four nations to win four medals. Following the 2004 Olympic Games and World Championships, Australia was ranked as the 3rd leading rowing nation in the world.

In 2005, Australia won six medals at the FISA World Championships in Gifu, and again finished near the top of the medal table.

In 2006, following another successful international season, with two crews winning at the World Championships, Australia finished the year as the number one nation in the world in Olympic boat classes.

At the 2007 World Championships, Australia won a total of seven medals, including three gold. This performance paved the way for Australia to qualify all 14 boats for the 2008 Beijing Olympic Games, only the second occasion a nation has done this in Olympic rowing history. In Beijing, Australia won two gold medals and one silver medal to rank second on the final medal table.

The 2009 World Championships saw the emergence of some new stars of Australian rowing, with only a few of the Beijing Olympic Team members returning to action. Australia won two silver medals and a bronze medal in Poznan, Poland.

The 2010 World Championships marked Australia's greatest ever medal haul at a world championships, with the team winning eight medals in total, including one gold, four silver and three bronze.
